## Cambodia





In Cambodia, the water wells in Kantout village have been made safer to visit, particularly at night by the installation of solar powered lights provided through the generosity of SI Karratha with the support of SI Helena and SI Port Hedland. Workers installed the lights under the supervision of a Phnom Penh member. Villagers are deeply appreciative of this funding.

# **Thailand**





SI Dusit continued their commitment to education in remote areas by a water based project in Ban Mae Phae Village where clearing of land for commercial crops had led to reduced water retention. They supported an exploratory drilling exercise for a new bore. This led to fresh water to replenish tanks that ran dry and created problems in health and sanitation for the school children. The water was made available to villagers in the afternoon as their supply was dirty. The villagers are committed to maintaining the system.

### Indonesia





SI Jakarta launched the Women Entrepreneurs Project in February 2018. The overall objective is to facilitate marginalized women living around our Community Learning Center (run by our partner: Titian Foundation) near South Jakarta to create small businesses within one year. This is a joint project with SI Okazaki, Japan, which provide the funding.

They have used group coaching to hold the space for the women to be accountable for taking steps in achieving their goals and integrating their learning into their real life and work.

SI Jakarta have provided the women with skills in how to improve the quality of their products, what the market will buy, and pricing strategies.

After running for 3 months, the women can work together effectively and produce handicrafts from tie-dye materials made by themselves. They also have been able to successfully sell the products.

The club will continue to facilitate & support their entrepreneurial efforts over the remainder of the year.



The Federation project Sanctuary is nearly ready to start. Agreements with five Fijian Ministries have been signed and land allocated for 3 sites. We are ready to start subject to the availability of the builder. It is hoped to have the first one finished this year.

President Anusha has announced that she will continue this project. All we need now is your financial support. Why not use funds or part funds from a fundraiser to donate to the project. There is a desperate need as the stories on the Sanctuary pamphlet show. Give generously to support our Fijian sisters.


